
FOSTER FAMILY HISTORY

John and Mary Foster


The 1841 English Census gives a snapshot view of John and Mary Foster and their family, living at Ashton-Under-Lyne, Lancashire.




The 1841 Census listed the Foster family living in **Cavendish Street**, Ashton Under Lyne:

Other household residents included William Coyle (35), Winifred Gunning (20), Mary Brennan (20), Elizabeth Jackson (20), Hannah Jackson (15), Charlotte Johnson (25) and Helen Goddard (2). It is unknown as to whether any of these people had family connections or were simply boarding with John and Mary and their family.

Leading on from the 1841 English Census further research reveals:

Mary Foster (nee Williams) was born in Wigan, Lancashire England and married John Foster at Wigan England on 20 April 1807.

Between 1807 and 1836 a number of children were raised by John and Mary as listed in the 1841 Census.

Later information reveals Mary may have given birth of up to 15 children.

Between 1841 and 1851 John Foster was to die as in the 1851 Census, Mary Foster was listed as a widow:

The United Kingdom Census of 1851 recorded the people residing in every household on the night of Sunday 30 March 1851.

As per the death certificate below it appears that John Foster died on 7 February 1851, just 3 weeks before the actual census was taken.

John Foster died at Worsborough Common (near the City of Barnsley, Yorkshire), aged 68 years. John Foster's occupation was listed as a weaver and it appears he may have died from asthma.

The informant was Joseph Foster (his son).




The <u>1851 English Census</u> shows Mary Foster had by this stage moved back to Barnsley, Yorkshire where many of her children had been born:

Mary, now aged 63yrs was an innkeeper living in Wilkinson Houses, Worsborough, Barnsley, Yorkshire.


She was living with her unmarried 42 year old daughter Elizabeth, her son James Foster 18 years and a 14 year old servant boy Richard Ellis.

In the next door house was her 20 year old son Joseph and his young 18 year old wife Martha.

Wilkinson Houses, Worsborough Common

In 2015 my wife Pam and I visited Worsborough looking for Wilkinson Houses. We met a Mrs Pearson in Wilkinson Street, Worsborough who invited us in for a "cuppa" and told us as much as she knew about the local area. Her house (pictured), in Wilkinson Street was obviously built much later than when Mary Foster lived there as the street was only opened in 1869.

It is believed however, that Wilkinson Houses may have originally existed in the nearby area.




<u>Pam (in the rain) standing outside Mrs Pearson's home</u> in Wilkinson Street, Worsborough, Yorkshire


Wilkinson Houses were indeed extensive in numbers extending from No: 265 in the 1851 Census Schedule to No: 296 in the 1851 Census Schedule – (over 30 houses).

Mary Foster (No: 288 on the schedule) had as her neighbour Mr Robert Wilkinson (No: 287 on the schedule), the 74 year old "Proprietor of the Houses" plus his 39 year old nephew Joseph Wilkinson.

Mary Foster – (following the death of her husband)

Evidence so far indicates that Mary Foster (nee Williams) arrived in Australia, as did several of her children, including her daughter Mary Ann Hardman (nee Foster).

(In a death certificate amendment, the name <u>Mary Williams</u> [mother's name] was added to the death certificate of her daughter Mary Hardman by Thomas Foster, a nephew of Mary Hardman, of 20 Lincoln Street Stanmore)



As stated on Mary Foster's death certificate, dated 15 June 1874, upon arrival in Australia she:

- Spent a year in Victoria before moving to New South Wales
- Spent 13 years living in New South Wales

The arrival of Mary Foster in Australia is unclear. It is presumed that she arrived in Melbourne as she spent her first in Victoria.

Mary Foster is likely to have arrived in Australia c1860 (at the height of the Victorian Goldrush).

- ✓ She was likely to have joined her daughter Mary Ann Hardman (nee Foster) who was with her husband John Hardman at Four Mile Flat, near Avoca on the Victorian goldfields.
- ✓ The discovery of gold at Lambing Flat (Young NSW) may have given the impulse to head into NSW.




FOSTER FAMILY ARRIVALS IN AUSTRALIA

Mary Foster is mentioned in Veronica McNamara's book "Beyond the Early Maps", selecting land at Bendick Murrell on 22 January 1867



In an article published below there is evidence of Mary Foster living in the Young area at Bendick Murrell:


MAINTENANCE - Andrew Rowan was summoned by Ada Hardiman, for the support of an illegitimate child.

Part of the evidence is listed below:

"To Mr Gordon: I was minding sheep within a half mile of the defendant when he was with my sister the first time; I can recollect the event very well, because <u>my grandmother died just afterwards</u>; I have often spoken to defendant; I am fourteen years of age; I was not talking to defendants brother when defendant was talking to my sister; defendants brother assisted to take the wheat away."

In the book "Bendick Murrell School Centenary" in an article reference to the "Kingsland" property, a Mrs Foster features:

"One tale about Mrs Foster's ghost lured many would be ghost hunters to "Kingsland" to sit sheltering in the pig sties up to 2am waiting to capture a glimpse of her ghost. The ghost in the form of a light was supposed to move across the paddock until its disappearance at a point on the fence. These outings were discontinued when a fire lit to keep the watchers warm caught a sty alight and burnt it down."

The photo is believed to be that of Mary Foster.

Close examination indicates the photo was taken by the

Royal Studio, 78 William Street, Sydney.

Internet research lists the studio as operating between 1841 and 1900.



Mary Foster died at Bendick Murrell on 15 June 1874. Her age was listed as 93 years but this is appears to be inaccurate.

The 1841 Census lists her age as 50 years (estimated birth year as 1791 - findmypast)

The 1851 Census lists her age as 63 years (estimated birth year as 1788 - findmypast)

If she married at Wigan in 1807 at 20 years of age (as stated on her death certificate), this would also give her an estimated birth year close to 1787-88.

Mary Foster's age at death is therefore more likely to be in the 87-88 year bracket.

Her death certificate indicated Mary giving birth to <u>15 children</u>:

- 4 males living Robert Foster, John Foster, Joseph Foster and James Foster
- 3 females living Mary Ann (Hardman), Elizabeth?
- 5 males deceased William (died 1857 at Gilmalari near Wellington)
- 3 females deceased

Many of the children thus remain unaccounted for at this stage in time:
